WHY ASK THEM TO SIGN?

The Taxpayers league recently sent out questionnaires to all candidates asking them to promise that, in case of election, they would not keep any of the fees of the office, but would turn them into the county treasury.

The framers of the document evidently failed to take into consideration those offices in which no fees are collected, such as treasurer, and assessor. The latter officer's position does not require that fees be paid in any instance. There is no matter to come to that department which demands a payment of fees, therefore to compel a candidate for that office to sign a statement that he would not hypothecate fees seems rather far-fetched.

In some instances a statement that he would not take fees to himself might be all right. An official, when he takes the oath of office, says he will support the law and conduct the affairs of his office in accordance with same. Then why subject him to the promise that he would be honest? All officials are presumed to be honest when elected. Should he prove derelict to his oath we have legal remedies for his transgression—even if it be withheld until the head of the legal department of the county was ready to invoke such remedies. To demand such a statement from all candidates seems to us to be in the line of compelling them to loosen hold of their self respect and be subjected to undue humiliation.

To use a failure to sign a promise-to-be-honest statement or suffer antagonism in his campaign for votes, is to us a sort of threat, and as such is not to be countenanced by right thinking and right meaning people. We believe a candidate should stand upon his own merits. If the voters regard one man as being better fitted for the office than another, all the threats imaginable should not stand in his way of election. Voters generally are fair and all the propaganda published against a man who fails to sign a statement at the behest and demand of any coterie or group of men is to be taken as selfishness pure and simple.

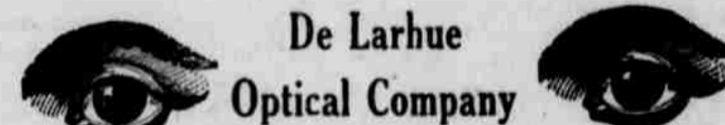
