

Comparison Is Made With Other Ureful Commodities

The average price of wheat on the farm in 1902 was 61 cents; corn was 26 cents and pork on the hoof was \$6.15 per hundred-weight. Patent flour was a dollar a sack, shoes sold for \$2.50 and a man's suit from \$15 to \$25. Twenty-five years ago the average rate for electricity was 36 cent per kilowatt. The averge rate for 1927 was 2.25 cents. If the cost of electricity had increased during the quarter of a century in the same ration as food products and elothing the present rate for domestic purposes would be much highter


