Preventive rather than remedial
measures should be used to control
contagious abortion of cattle, a dis-
ease from which the losses have great-
ly increased in the past ten years.
Effort expended to destroy infection
before it reaches susceptible animals
is worth more than effort to combat
after it has done so.

Sows and pigs fed by self-feeders
are more thrifty than those hand
fed, according to the U. S. Depart-
ment of Agriculture, and the feed
cost per 100 pounds of gain is mat-
erially less in self-fed lots. Pigs
on the Department of Agriculture
farm that were self fed made 100
pounds of gain an 441.06 pounds of
feed, whereas the pigs that were
hand fed required 603.09 pounds of
feed for 100 pounds of gain. When
hogs of any age have constant ac-
cess to self-feeders there is little
danger of their overeating at any
time, a valuable factor in the use of
self-feeders for sows which are
suckling their litters.

Proper care and feeding of swine
after inoculation for hog cholera is
an important factor in the successful
treatment of a herd. When pigs are
treated after they are weaned it is
best not to make any decided change
in the ration, but the quantity should
be reduced a least one-half, allowing
the treated pigs to graze and exer-
cise in a clean pasture, where they
are no running streams or mud wal-
lows. At the end of 2 weeks, if the
hogs are doing well the feed may be
gradually increased for about a
week when they may get all they will
eat. In the case of the inoculation
of pigs while they are suckling their
dams, no change of feed or manage-
ment is necessary.

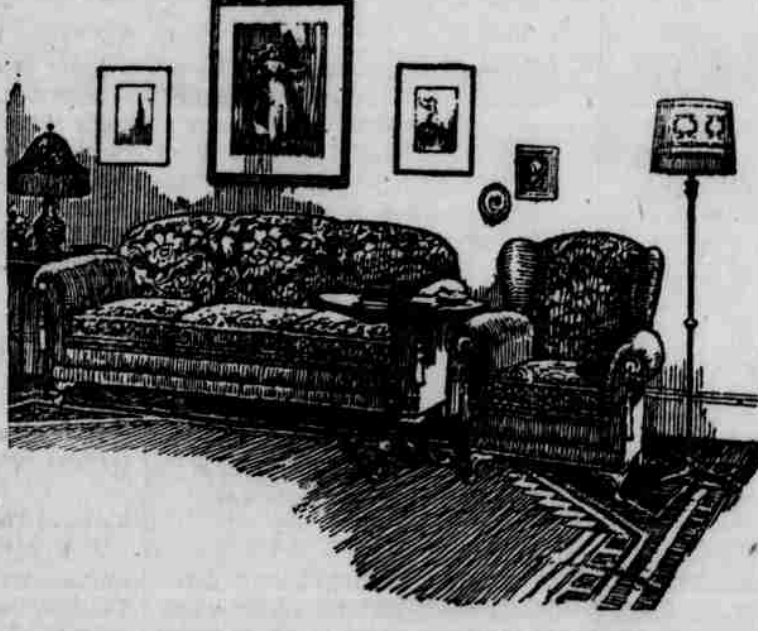
