LOW FARE ARRANGED FOR INAUGURATION MADE BY U. P.

Tickets on Sale February 25, 26 and 27—Many From West to Go To Washington

Fare and one-half for the round trip from Pacific Northwest point to Washington, D. C., has been announced by the Union Pacific on account of the inauguration of President Elect Herbert Hoover March 4.

The special low fare tickets will be on sale February 25, 26 and 27 and the final return limit will be March 15. Passengers can take advantage of the reduced rate to visit other eastern points, although the rate applies only to Washington, D. C. The tickets will be good for stop-overs at all points west of Chicago and at points east of Chicago where stop-overs are allowed on regular one-way tickets. A saving of \$37.06, for example, is effected by buying a ticket at the special rate from Portland to Washington and return.

HOLD JOINT FISH CONFERENCE

Oregon and Washington to Get Together on Fish Law

A joint fish conference with Washington will be held at Olympia, Washington, on February 2, according to the provision of a senate resolution which will be introduced Monday by the Senate Fisheries Committee. All fish laws concerning the Columbia river must be agreed upon in a joint meeting of committees from the two legislatures, according to a contract between the two states which was ratified in 1918 by the Federal Congress. Any law which is not agreed upon in this conference and passed in both states is not legal.

The committee from Oregon will consist of five senators appointed by the President of the Senate and five Representatives named by the speaker of the house, with a similar delegation from Washington. A number of bills are to be brought up in the meeting concerning gear, equipment, season, etc. After a bill is agreed upon by this conference it must be passed in identical words in each state legislature.

FUNNY BEE IN HIS BONNET

Would Do Away With Washington's Birthday

Holidays have reached their zenith, especially school holidays, said Representative James H. Hazlett, of Hood River county, when questioned concerning a bill he introduced into the House during the current legislative session. His bill proposes to amend an Oregon law to do away with Washington's birthday as a school holiday.

Representative Hazlett pointed out that under the present law it is necessary for school to be called for at least an hour and a half before dismissal for the holiday. In rural districts where it is necessary to transport the pupils to and from school, the day is not only disrupted but there is a needless expense to the district.

It is the opinion of Representative Hazlett that holidays have increased beyond reason, both for the schools and the business world. Banks, he said, are beginning to protest at the number of legal holidays which interfere with their regular business.
