The Union Pacific stages have bought the lines and buses of the Blue Mountain Transportation company and will begin operation of same under its name.

The newly acquired lines operate between Pendleton and Lewiston via Walla Walla, and also between Pendleton and Colfax, Washington. With the change in goes the valuable privilege to do interstate business in the state of Washington. At present the Union Pacific stages can do interstate business between Washington and Oregon and between Washington and Idaho but cannot take ticket passengers from one Washington town to another town in that state.
