TEN COMMANDMENTS OF OUR NATIONAL FORESTS

Some Don'ts That Should be Observed When Camping in Nature's Hills and Valleys

1. Thou shalt not smoke in any part of a national forest closed to smokers. For verily a cigarette costing but a fraction of a cent, when thrown into the brush can destroy hundreds of trees which will be needed some day to keep the Northwest prosperous.
2. Thou shalt not build thy camp fire except in a posted camp. For verily a small park blown into the trees, can lay waste to vast areas of valuable watershed.
3. Thou shalt not pollute any stream, for the thirsty wayfarer careth not to drink the washings of thy feet nor the feet of thy children.
4. Thou shalt not deface the trees, for the other hiker careth not about thy name; thy address, nor thy love affairs.
5. Thou shalt not build a camp fire before obtaining a permit, for the ranger fain would talk with thee before thou ventur'eth into the for-

est.
 6. Thus shalt not leave a litter of papers and tin cans when thou abandon the camp, for it maketh thy playground look like a city dump.
 7. Thou shalt not pick the flowers nor the shrubs, nor dig up small trees to take home, for if every one did thus, the national forests would soon be denuded of all vegetation.
 8. Thou shalt not take offense if the ranger stoppeth to caution thee about thy camp fire, for verily he is a friendly fellow, and hath the interest of thy forest at heart.
 9. Thou shalt not make targets of the ranger's signs, for he hath worked many hours to place these signs for the guidance of visitors.
 10. Thou shalt not do anything which marreth or destroyeth the beauty of the forest, for if one approacheth them in peace and reverence, he shall again find his soul which he loseth in the city.

IGNORANCE EXPOSED BY TENDERFOOT'S CAMP FIRE

Shown By Way He Makes and Leaves Fire Place After Using It In the Woods

"You can always identify the 'tenderfoot' in the wood, by looking at his camp fire," says the rangers of Oregon and Washington. "The experienced woodsman does not build a fire that has any of the three faults usually found in the tenderfoot's fire.

"The tenderfoot builds a fire too big for his need or for his convenience.

"He builds it where it is likely to spread—either in dry grass or brush, or against a dead log that may smoulder after his party leaves, and then cause a destructive forest

fire.
 "The tenderfoot's fire does not ignite easily or burn satisfactory because he uses poor judgment in selecting kindling material and fuel."
 A good camp fire for cooking is not so large that it cooks the cook as well as the food. A bed of hot coals is preferable to a blaze for cooking. The wise camper collects a few dry needles and dead twigs and starts his fire small, adding larger sticks as it gains in size. If the woods are wet it is possible to secure fuel by chopping off the surface of a dead log or stump.
 Never build a camp fire against a dead stump or log that may hold fire after the need for fire has passed. Build it away from trees, brush and grass, and on bare ground or rocks. Dry needles, leaves and debris should be scraped away within a radius of 5 feet or more of the fire.

It is best to dig a shallow pit for the fire, or build a small stone fire place.

Above all, the wise camper knows how to put out his fire, and makes certain it is completely extinguished before he leaves. Four water on the embers and stir them to make sure no spark is left. Then, to be absolutely sure, pour on more water, until you have DROWNED out every spark.

French toast is not only a good way to use up stale bread, but a very appetizing addition to breakfast, lunch, or supper. It can be used in place of potatoes, rice, or other starchy food for dinner, or as a main dish with sirup for lunch. Allow one-half to three-fourths cup of milk to two eggs, and salt lightly. Beat the mixture, dip the slices of bread into it, and fry in butter or well-seasoned fat in a heavy smooth skillet. Use moderate heat and let the toast become golden brown before turning.

Fruit Muffins And Pancakes



FROM hot cross buns for Easter to pancakes on Shrove Tuesday, quick breads maintain a proud position in our menus. Everyone loves the airy pop-over, the luscious muffin, or the tender biscuit. But sometimes—for instance, when company comes—you want to have something just a little special, something more unusual than a plain hot bread. So why not dress them up in party clothes by adding a little fruit to the batter? You can't imagine how good the fruit biscuits and muffins will be until you try them. And they are simple to make, too.

Pineapple Pancakes: Mix and sift two cups flour, one-half teaspoon salt, and four teaspoons baking powder. Add one beaten egg mixed with one and one-fourth cups milk, one cup crushed Hawaiian pineapple and one tablespoon melted fat. Bake on a hot greased griddle.

Blueberry Muffins: Mix and sift two cups flour, three tablespoons sugar, four teaspoons baking powder and one-half teaspoon salt. Add two well beaten eggs mixed with one cup milk; stir in three tablespoons melted butter and three-fourths cup drained, canned blueberries. Bake in greased muffin tins at 400 degrees F., for twenty to twenty-five minutes.

Wholesome Cherry Muffins: Beat one egg, add two tablespoons sugar and one cup sour milk. Mix and sift one cup flour, one and one-half teaspoons baking powder, one-half teaspoon soda and one-half teaspoon salt, then stir in one cup whole-wheat flour. Mix with the egg and milk mixture, and add four tablespoons melted butter and one-half cup drained, canned red pitted cherries. Bake in a hot oven for twenty to twenty-five minutes.

Fall Is Soup Time

APPETIZING autumn soups from a can of tomatoes! Doesn't that sound good? And the soups are good, too. And what fun it is to see how many different varieties of soup can be made from this one base. Anything from a nutritious cream soup to a light consommé may eventuate. Just to show what variety can be achieved, here are a few recipes:

Warm Red Soups
Pimento Soup: Bring three cups strained canned tomato juice, three cups water, two teaspoons salt, one-eighth teaspoon pepper, and six drops tabasco sauce to the boiling point. Add two tablespoons of uncooked cream of wheat and two chopped minced pimientos. Cook twenty minutes. Serve with a thin slice of lemon in each cup.
Cream of Tomato Soup: Scald four cups of milk and thicken with four tablespoons flour mixed with enough cold water so that it will pour; cook in a double boiler, stirring until it is thick. Cook contents of half a can of tomatoes with two teaspoons sugar for fifteen minutes; add one-fourth teaspoon soda and rub through a sieve. Pour the hot milk into the tomato. Place a lump of butter in each soup bowl, and pour the soup over it.
Peanut-Tomato Bouillon: Smooth six tablespoons peanut butter with one and one-half cups hot water, add three cups canned tomatoes, one teaspoon salt, one-eighth teaspoon pepper and one-half teaspoon paprika; cook five minutes. Strain; add one tablespoon butter. Serve with parsley crostons. To make out stale bread one-fourth inch thick and then in crescent shapes. Toast, dip in finely chopped parsley, and brown under broiler.
