A Once-A-Week Service to Weeklies and Semi-Weeklies
Have you figured out the amounts of various feeds the dairy cow will need for the coming year? A cow weighing 1,000 pounds and giving 25 pounds of milk a day testing 4 per cent will require in one year, when the pasture season lasts for 6 months, 5,400 pounds of silage, 2,500 pounds of hay, and 2,000 pounds of grain. Larger or high producing cows will need a little more feed, and smaller or low-producing cows a little less.

Cyst formation of chicken is a condition which occurs occasionally is not any flock, and is not of an infectious nature, says the Oregon experiment station.

Although it is especially important that vegetables grown in Oregon for shipment to other states be standardized and graded carefully, it is almost equally important to observe proper grades and standards in growing vegetables for the canneries of the state, says the experiment station, as canned goods are bought on

a close margin of grades. Careful grading even for local markets has also been found to react to the benefit of the grower.

FARM REMINDERS

The condition known as blossom end rot or point rot of tomatoes is not due to any kind of fungus or bacterial parasite, but rather to excessive evaporation from the foliage, reports the Oregon experiment station. It is especially troublesome where abundant foliage development due to rich soil and plenty of moisture, is followed by hot dry weather. This may be avoided to some extent by moderate watering early in the season, and providing for adequate moisture supply right through the season.

It is important that the Bordeaux mixture used for peach blight control be of the best quality, so that it will adhere throughout the entire fall period, and that it be applied as soon as possible after the crop is removed from the trees, says the Oregon experiment station.

Reinous substances such as sticky fly paper are often hard to remove from clothing. Try turpentine, benzol, carbon tetrachloride, chloroform, wood or denatured alcohol, ether, kerosene or gasoline.

Sun baths should be given to all well children to keep them well and to many sick children to help make them well. They should, however, be given carefully at first, exposing only a small area of the child's skin to the sunlight until he is used to it and has acquired a protective coat of tan.

That age and health of the animal affect both weight and strength of the fleece, as well as mutton production, is a fact carefully considered by the wool grower in culling his flock, says the Oregon experiment station. It is believed that length and density mean less shrinkage after clipping. Fineness of fiber is also an important consideration.

Union Pacific Railway Issues Three-Color Folder

The scenic beauties of the Pacific Northwest are described in a three-color folder, recently issued by the Union Pacific, containing photographs of Northwest attractions. "Heralded as 'The Charmed Land of Scenic Surprises and Glories,' the Pacific Northwest fulfills the traveler's expectations. It offers him warm ocean beaches, snow-clad mountains, interesting cities or any form of outing activity he may desire. It has two National parks, Crater Lake in Oregon and Rainier in Washington, either one worthy of a special visit; and two-fifths of the standing timber in the United States." This is the manner in which the folder recommends the Pacific Northwest to 17,000 railroad ticket agents throughout the eastern and mid-western states.

UNITED QUITS ALL COUPONS

Chain Adds 200,000 Customers by Use of Newspapers

For years the United Cigar Stores Co. has used little or no advertising beyond the distribution of coupons redeemable in merchandise. Recently the company announced it had discontinued the coupon giving and would start newspaper advertising as the result of an advertising experiment by which, through newspaper space, 200,000 customers were added on the Pacific coast in one month. On May 24 the new merchandising policy, with newspaper advertising, was put into effect all over the country. "The result for the first week," said A. C. Allen, vice-president of the company, "was to bring in approximately 500,000 additional customers to the United Cigar Stores. The abolition of the coupon form of merchandising will result in a saving of approximately \$2,500,000 a year, part of which sum will be turned over to a permanent increase in the use of newspaper space."

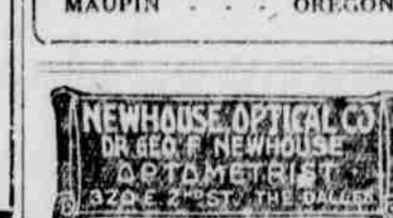

Corn—This Month's Economy



In combination with fresh vegetables, canned ones may often be used to good advantage. For instance, a judicious blending of canned corn with fresh squash, celery or tomatoes will result in a dish which is unusual and delicious. At the same time the reasonable price of the canned food will offset the higher cost of the fresh, and so will lower the total cost for the dish. Here are some recipes which show how canned corn can be combined with other foods.

New Corn Recipes

Summer Squash with Corn: Sauté one sliced onion in three tablespoons of drippings, add a pound of peeled and thinly-sliced summer squash and sauté a few minutes longer. Add one cup water, cover squash, and cook gently until tender. Add one cup of canned corn, one

teaspoon salt and one-eighth teaspoon pepper and bring to boiling.

Mexican Corn: Sauté one chopped onion in two tablespoons butter until golden brown, add one tablespoon flour and stir smooth. Add two cups chopped, fresh tomatoes, two cups canned corn, two chopped pimientos, one teaspoon salt, one teaspoon sage and one-eighth teaspoon pepper. Pour into a buttered baking dish, cover thickly with crumbs and brown in a hot oven.

Indian Corn: Dice one green pepper and sauté in two tablespoons butter until a golden brown. Cut link sausages into slices, add to pan and sauté until about half done. Add salt and pepper, contents of a number 2 can of corn, one-half cup milk and two slightly beaten eggs. Mix well. Pour into buttered baking dish and bake about thirty minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.).*
