A thorough application of Bordeaux spray to shade trees and the shrubbery in the fall will last several years, acting as a protection against moths and lichen, finds the Oregon experiment station. This treatment is being used by some walnut growers of the state for the same purpose. The standard spray is a 6-6-50 solution.

In preparing a vegetable dinner it is best always to plan to include some form of protein, either by using beans or peas as one of the vegetables, or by combining some vegetable with a protein food such as cheese, milk, eggs or chopped meat. Examples of vegetables with a meat mixture, cauliflower or po-

tatoes scalloped with cheese, spinach with hard-boiled eggs, and sweet corn pudding made with milk and eggs.
