KIRKPATRICK SECURES BIG ADVERTISING CONTRACT

Leading Portland Advertising Agency Will Prepare Matter for Exploitation of State

Announcement has been made by W. G. Ide, manager, state chamber of commerce that the contract for preparation of copy, booklets and be used in the statewide advertising and development program, for which the recent legislature appropriated \$25,000 has been awarded to the W S. Kirkpatreik Advertising Service, Portland. The award was made by the directors of the state chamber and approved by the state board of control. Mr. Ide states that a great deal of statistical information and pictures of agricultural and industrial operations in Oregon have been collected already and preparing the booklets and literature will now go shead.

The advertising campaign in newspapers and farm publications will start on January 1, and all followup literature and material will be ready to answer inquiries on all phases of Oregon opportunities.

"INSIDE" INFORMATION

The U. S. D. A. has a new leaflet, No. 45. "Pork in Preferred Ways," which contain many seasonable recipes for this excellent meat.

In cooking conserves and jams watch your kettle closely as they may scorch. An asbestos mat placed under the kettle is a safeguard.

Tart, underripe apples are best for making jelly or pectin for future jelly-making. Crab apples are especially good for jelly. Partly green fruits usually make more jelly per pound of fruit than do ripe fruits.

U.e two pans when you wash pinach. Trim the leaves from the stalks, first; much of the grit that clings to spinach is at the lower ends of the stalks. Lift the spinach from the first pan to the sceond, letting the cand settle; change the water each time you tranfer the spinach; wash in five or six waters f necessary. If the spinach is unusually free from sand or grit, it may be put in the colander and washed under running water, but the first way gives more certain result. Enough water will cling to the leaves after the washing to start cooking the spinach. Cover it closely at first to it will steam, then remove the cover and cook as short a time a possible-ten of fifteen minutes. soon as it is tender, drain it, chop it and season with salt and melted butter or thick cream. Serve hot.
