LOSES BET—AND HIS CAR

A certain gentleman bet his friends he could drop a lighted cigarette into the gasoline tank of his car and that the cigarette would simply be put out. His friends took him up and the test was made.

When he dropped the cigarette there was no hesitation or delay—he lost his bet and his car too. All he gained were some painful burns, a lot of excitement and an entirely new knowledge of the properties of gasoline.

Perhaps the gentleman had read somewhere that liquid gasoline will not ignite—and exceedingly dangerous half-truth. You can't have gasoline in an open vessel without also having the deadly dangerous gasoline vapor. And the glowing butt must first pass through the vapor, which is ignited by the smallest of sparks.

This incident should be a warning to all that gasoline ignites easily. Great property damage results every year from accidents with petroleum and its products and from their misuse. Reports to The National Board of Fire Underwriters for the year 1928 indicated a total fire loss from this cause of over \$15,250,000.

You would not play with dynamite. Give gasoline the same degree of respect.

It takes more than a teaching force to make a good school. Both the teachers and student body must work in harmony in order that the school be made a success. A principal who takes upon himself the responsibility of making the school assumes a task too large to carry alone. The result is the school suffers, the principal loses prestige and the community is placed in an unenviable position. The recent school eruption at Tygh Valley in which the students rebelled against the arbitrary and uncalled for rules laid down by the principal, and the final release of the principal as head of the school is to be regretted. Only prompt action on the part of

those suffering from such arbitrary actions saved the balance of the school year for progress. Let us hope things will go ahead as they should under the direction of one who has proved capable as principal in other places and that the Tygh Valley school student body and teachers will again work to the good of the educational system of the hustling community.

To deny that is nothing more nor less than criminal. And when that man, through petition, seeks to set aside the decree of the court in an attempt to regain his children's custody, he shows an ignorance that has no place in a civilized community.
