UNION PACIFIC BUYS WORLD'S LARGEST LOCIES
 New Power Units Have 12 Drive Wheels, Each—25 Have Boes Purchased

Twenty-five of the largest fast freight locomotives in the world will be purchased within a few days by the Union Pacific System, it was announced today by Carl R. Gray, President. The purchase involves an expenditure of three and one-half million dollars and the building of the giant locomotive, will begin immediately. The engines will be of the "9000 class Union Pacific type" and were designed by Union Pacific engineers after years of research and experimenting. The completion of delivery of the new fleet will bring the total of this type of locomotives now in service on the transcontinental lines of the Union Pacific System to 88.

Each of the locomotives is 102 feet 6 and one-half inches in length, 11 feet 2 inches in width and 16 feet 1 and one-half inches in height, standard, in discussing the new inches in diameter.

"It is to meet the ever increasing demands for expeditions movement of perishable and manifest freight that we decided to make this purchase," said E. E. Adams, vice-president in charge of purchases and standards in discussing the new equipment.
