Not infrequently complaints are expressed by our local merchants that they are unable to handle all the butter brought in from the country, or if they do it is often at a loss. The creamery and butter houses of Portland refuse to take the overplus at a figure that is at all reasonable, consequently the merchant who gets a supply on hand that he can not sell at home finds, if he has paid a reasonable price for it, that he is a loser on the deal. It has been suggested as a way out of the difficulty that those who have the cream instead of making it into butter that they ship it to Portland creameries. These creameries, it is said, agree to take all the cream sent them and pay prevailing prices, but they do not want the country butter. The price they would pay for January cream is 28 1-2 cents delivered. It is believed that this is a much better price than what can be got for the butter, and would pay a better premium on the investment. During the winter months one or two shipments to town each week would be sufficient. The expense for shipment to town would be light, only a few receiving cans would be required. Of course, the separator would have to be used. Would this be the most profitable and easiest way of disposing of the country's cream? THE NEWS wants to hear from some of the farmers on the subject. A meeting has been proposed to discuss the idea and see if some agreement can be arrived at, and it seems that if the sentiment is strong enough in its favor this would be the first thing to do. What we should have is a creamery in Estacada, but arrangements should be made for the present, and a creamery will undoubtedly come within a year. Shall there be a meeting?
