The bill looking to a constitutional convention has failed, and Oregon will "get along some way" for awhile longer with her present constitution.

There is nothing quite so commendatory and cheering as a good word, now and then, from an old friend, and so we reprint the following from the Eureka, South Dakota Post: From the Estacada News we see that our old friends, A. Our State Senator, G. C. Brownell has not been overlooked by the Federal Grand Jury, and yesterday an indictment was returned against him. The jury allege that the senator, when doing work for the Government Surveyor General's office, was guilty of subornation of perjury in inducing others to make false affidavits. Senator Mitchell received another recognition from the jury, in the form of an indictment charging him, while in office, with taking compensation from individuals for furthering matters relating to work of the government. President Roosevelt has delivered another one of his characteristic addresses at the banquet of the Union League in Philadelphia, Monday evening. The president is a firm believer in the individual as being the greatest item in the sum-total of a nation there is. He says that it is impossible permanently to keep material prosperity unless there is back of it a basis of right living and right thinking! Again, ours is not a government which recognizes classes. It is based on the recognition of the individual. President Roosevelt never misses an opportunity to preach the gospel of correct living to the people. In this respect he is considerable of a preacher-president. However, there is not a man who voted against him, nor one who voted for him but will agree that the president is right. What kind of an individual are you, and what is your home? Are you a follower of President Roosevelt?

Estacada Wood Manufacturing Company Meet

The first meeting of the Estacada Wood Manufacturing Company was held at its offices Monday afternoon. It was the initiative meeting of the stockholders since the incorporation of the company, and was for the purpose of deciding on a course of business and to elect a board of directors. The following gentlemen, from among the stockholders, were elected as the company's first board of directors: J. W. Shafford, A. F. Campbell, G. W. Morrow, R. A. Stratton, S. E. Smith and C. C. Shafford. After the election of the board of directors, the later met and elected officers as follows: President, J. W. Shafford; Vice-President, Saylor E. Smith; Secretary, R. A. Stratton; Treasurer, C. C. Shafford. It is the intention of the company to proceed with the work at the factory until it is completed. The building is about ready for the machinery but the boiler and engine room will have to be added before the installation of the machinery. A committee was appointed to make arrangements with the milling firms around Estacada to furnish the new factory the necessary sawed material which will consist chiefly of the better grades of lumber. Parts of the machinery will have to be made to order which will take more time than it otherwise would.
