**Would Begin Work on  
Brick Plant April 1st.**

The secretary of the C. R. Ham-  
mond Brick Machine Manufac-  
turing Company who are figuring on  
getting the contract for putting up  
the large factory for the Estacada  
Brick & Tile Company assures the  
company that should his firm be  
successful in getting the work that  
he would begin work April first.

**A Large Dry Kiln**

The Estacada Wood Manufactur-  
ing Company is building a large dry  
kiln which will be a part of its big  
factory. The kiln is just west of  
the main building, and is 24x80 ft.  
with a daily capacity of 20,000 feet  
of lumber a day. Ten tons of iron  
piping will be used in heating the  
kiln, and the building is being put  
up well and in a way to make the  
work as convenient as possible.

**Are We to Have Woolen  
Mills?**

The woolen mills company which  
intended to put mills in at Sellwood  
have given up that place on account  
of not be able to make satisfactory  
terms, and they have been in Esta-  
cada the past week looking for a  
suitable location for the mill. A  
site was picked out across the river  
on the south side where Springwater  
creek empties into the Clackamas.  
Representatives of the company were  
here and examined the site and took  
measurements of the amount of wa-  
ter flowing in the creek. A certain  
amount of water will be required to  
wash the wool, and for other pur-  
poses. Plenty of water was found for  
all the mill's uses.

quipped to handle as large work as

60-horse power engines will be used
