Morrow Station

The railway company has named the new station one mile north of town, Morrow, after the president of the Oregon Water Power Townsite Co. Mr. Morrow will soon have the new place surveyed and staked off in town lots. It will, no doubt, become a suburb of the City of Estacada some day.

The County Assessment

Assessor Nelson started his numerous deputy assessors out last Monday morning taking the assessment of the county. Six are in the field. A census of persons subject to do military duty, as well as industrial statistics will be compiled. Three months will be required to complete the work, and the territory has been assigned as follows: the Cities and towns, Fred J. Nelson; Eagle Creek Highland and Canyon Creek, J. C. Bradley; West side and south of the Willamette river to Marion county, J. K. Morris; a strip of land 2 miles wide extending along the east side of the Willamette river from north side of the county to Ely, C. H. Dauchy; a strip of land three miles wide and extending from Ely to the south end of the county with the Oregon City-Molalla road as the division line, E. E. Taylor and J. W. McAnulty.

A NEW SAWMILL

A Mill of 80,000 Feet Daily Capacity to Build in Estacada

One of the latest acquisitions to the industrial life of Estacada is a sawmill plant. Portland and San Francisco men are backing the project, and THE NEWS is authoritatively informed that the mill is a certainty. The mill will be located just west of the wood factory, and will have a capacity when operated with double shift of 80,000 feet a day. It is understood the mill will supply the unfinished material for the wood factory.
