At this late date the county is to appropriate \$1,000 for the county exhibit at the fair. Well, it is better to be late than not to have any exhibit; and there is plenty time in which to arrange the display.

More than 1,000 money orders have been issued in the Estacada postoffice since it was established a little over a year ago. This is a good showing, and perhaps is better than it would have been if there had been a bank here.

North Dakota will have the log cabin in which President Roosevelt lived while a rancher placed among that state's exhibits at the Lewis & Clark Exposition. The old shanty will look just as it did when Roosevelt lived in it as a rancher. It is not probable, however, that the Administration party will care to take quarters at the cabin while at the Exposition.

The Debois Lumber Company of Estacada has placed an ad in The News. This company's mill is located in a body of fine timber one and a half mile west of town. The logs are nearly all on land owned by the company. The mill is turning out from 10,000 to 35,000 feet a day and the planer and moulder is kept busy working up finished material. C. E. Dubois, manager of the company, reports business good, and a growing demand for high grade lumber of which he makes a specialty in fir and cedar.

When at his Springwater farm, last week, Frank Busch took some of the fine Venetian ochre from his mineral paint beds, mixed it with liquids and painted his farm house.

Among the Clackamas county exhibits at the Fair will be the piece of an oak tree, in which is imbedded the horns of a deer. About 25 years ago George Perdue of Needy placed the deer horns in the fork of the tree and left them there. Slowly and surely the tree grew around the horns, and now only the tips can be discerned.
