Twentyfive Cent Charge for the Evening Admittance

Liberati's famous Italian band of 50 pieces is now giving two free concerts daily at the Lewis and Clark Exposition.

In the Idaho building at the Fair there is a pyramid of nearly pure lead ore that weighs 60,000 pounds. One specimen weighs 10,000 lbs. Idaho produces annually 40 percent of the lead mined in the U. S. and 27 per cent of the world's supply.

In the Foreign exhibits building at the Fair there is a reproduction of Raphael's "Sistine Madonna," done entirely in needlework. The reproduction was made by a young German girl, Fraulein Clara Ripberger, and is considered the most wonderful example of art needlework ever created.

The free illustrated lectures by Barry Bulkley of Washington, D.C. which are given every afternoon at 4 in the government building at the Fair are attracting large audiences. Mr. Bulkley speaks eloquently on the wonders of the Yellowstone national park, and his talk is beautifully illustrated by colored lantern slides.

The price of admission to the fair grounds in the evening has been reduced, by a provision whereby a purchaser of a 50ct admission ticket receives with his ticket coupons that admit him to 25cts worth of shows on the Trail. The arrangement is proving popular. This was done because it was thought that the 50c charge that merely permitted the holder to the grounds was unreasonable since the exhibit palaces were not open.

Since the above was set up, the management of the Fair have made another popular change—only 25cts will be charged for evening admittance to the fair grounds. Now the people may listen to as good band music as the world affords, witness what is conceded to be the best illumination in general scheme that has ever been seen at any expositions, enjoy the cool evening in a beautiful park, and in a few days will have admission to a collection of works of a higher standard than has ever before been seen.

They will see the special attractions such as acrobatic feats, fireworks, and an opportunity of attending the Trail. The 25ct rate will no doubt make the evening attendance a much larger one than it has been, and make the Exposition more popular than ever. The fair grounds is where the crowds shall go from now on to spend their evenings.

50 Igorrotes of the head hunting tribe reaches Portland about Aug 1 and will build a village of their native huts and become at once a feature of the Lewis and Clark Exposition. They come by consent of the U. S. Government.
