

The company was given permission to go ahead and construct I. Brown, of the O. W. P. & Ry. Company came before the council and stated that the railroad company was disposed to sell to the city the water system and all property and asked, rights belonging to same for \$7500. The cost to the company of this water system, as stated by Mr. Brown, was more than \$7,500. It was the opinion that inasmuch as the city is about to bond for \$5,000 to put in a sewer system, it would be too much of a debt to incur now. Two names were mentioned for city attorney, J. E.
