The funeral of Mr. O'Neil took place today at this place at 11 a. m. The deceased died at Hillsboro and was a brother of Mrs. Lucy Glover.

Last Sunday as Henry McGugen, pioneer of '56 and one of Clackamas county's most highly respected citizens, was stepping from the car at Boring he slipped and fell striking his head on a frog of the railroad track cutting a long gash over the right eye clear to the skull producing concussion of the brain. The crew of the car picked him up and put him in the

mail compartment and he was brought to Estacada where local physician put eight stitches in the wound and later in the day saw him safely at Boring where his family met him and took him to his home five miles beyond Sandy. Latest accounts say that he is doing as well as possible under the circumstances. Mr. McGugen is in his 71 year and has resided here for about 40 years.
