Mutual Telephone Exchange

There are at present four separate telephone telephone exchanges doing business in Clackamas county, and as yet none of them come into Oregon City. It is the purpose of the company which is being organized to eventually consolidate all of the companies and bring their subscribers in touch with the city. The stock of the

new company will be \$7,500 and this is being subscribed to liberally.

Machinery For Cazadero.

All the Machinery for the Big Power Plant Ordered

It has been officially announced that the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company has placed a \$150,000 contract for machinery with Manning, Maxwell & Moore, the Westinghouse people and other firms here, to deliver by January next, for installation in its Cazadero plant. The machinery consists of electric transformers, generators and turbine wheels sufficient to develop 20,000 horse-power from the Clackamas River.

Why Not A Poultry Yard?

There Seems To Be A Good Opening Here For One

Eggs 33 cents a dozen and hard to get at that price was the condition of the local egg market last week. Have all the hens gone on a strike? Eggs were shipped in from Portland and Viola last week. The poultry and egg business ought not to be a losing one here, certain, with such a price prevailing for hen fruit. We do not know of anyone in the poultry business near here for the profit there is in it at selling eggs. But at 33 cents a dozen, or even much less than that, why would not the business pay? Twenty five cents a dozen is considered a good price for eggs in the Central East and money is made keeping hens at that. A few more firstrate egg laying hens would be a paying investment for someone here in Estacada.
