The State Game Laws

What You Are Expected to
Do to be a Legitimate
Huntsman

Sec. 1. It is hereby prohibited
and hereafter it shall be unlawful
for any person within the state of
Oregon to hunt for, pursue, take,
catch or kill any of the game ani-
mals, fowls, or birds, protected by
the laws of the State of Oregon,
during the open season when it is
lawful to kill the same, without
such person having in his personal
possession and carrying with him at
the time of said hunting, pursuing,
taking, catching or killing, a license
therefor duly issued to him by the
county clerk of one of the counties;
provided however that no license
shall be required of a man or mem-
ber of his own family for permis-
sion to hunt on his own lands of this
state; the county clerk of each and
every county of the State of Oregon
is hereby authorized to issue such
license under the provisions of this
act. Such license shall be number-
ed and rated and shall contain a
brief description of the person to
whom the same is issued, together
with the name and place of resi-
dence of such person. Any license
issued to any person according to
the provisions of this act shall be
at all times subject to the inspection
of any officer of the State of Oregon
charged with the enforcement of the
game laws, or any sheriff or deputy
sheriff or constable within the state,
or the owner, or his agent or repre-
sentative of the real property upon
which the holder of such license
may be hunting.

Sec. 2. All licenses provided for
in this act shall be issued as follows:
upon application therefor by any
person, either a resident or non-res-
ident of this state, an annual license
shall be issued to such person by
the county clerk to whom such ap-
plication shall be made, for the pur-
pose of hunting for, taking, catch-
ing or killing of any of the wild fowl
game birds or animals protected by
the laws of the State of Oregon, and
which said license shall entitle the
person to whom such license is is-
sued to hunt for, pursue, take, catch
or kill any of the said game animals
or birds within the State of Oregon
during the open season when it is
lawful to kill the same. No license
shall be granted for a period longer

CLACKAMAS FISHING

Deputy Sheriff W. B. Hollingsworth
has returned from a ten days hunting trip
about the regions of the upper Clacka-
mas river. He was a member of a party
of four who "packed in" 32 miles
southeast of Estacada and spent a part
of their time in camp near where Oak Grove
river empties into the Clackamas. The
party killed five deer, cougars, one bear,
dozens of wild fowl and caught scores of
trout ranging from 12 to 48 inches in
length. "We went to a place that is
hard to get into and where few hunters
bother," said Hollingsworth "and game
was plentiful. The place we camped was
an ideal one, and the scenery on the way
there is the grandest I have ever seen in
my life. From the top of Roaring moun-
tain we could see beyond Mount Hood
and Mount Jefferson; old Table rock and
Bald mountain were covered with snow;
the forests we passed through were silent
as the grave, save where the stillness was
broken by a tumbling mountain stream.
Whenever I can get off for an other hunt-
ing trip, it's me to the head waters of the
Clackamas."
