**THE ESTACADA BRICK PLANT WORKING.**

The brick factory is a reality, and the brick made are the real article. Wednesday was a holiday, a day of celebration for Estacadans. At 3 o'clock in the afternoon every business house in town closed, and all the people visited the brick factory to witness the manufacture of the first pressed brick. After a brief dedicatory speech by Mr. G. W. Morrow the ponderous machinery was set in motion, and the Estacada brick factory was at work manufacturing a fine quality of pressed red brick from clay out of the earth

not farther than a hundred yards from the factory. When the big press turned out the first brick the crowd gave a loud hurrah. About 400 brick were made, and nearly everybody carried one away with them to keep as a souvenir. The plant is ready for continuous work, and will turn out 20,000 brick daily. Manager Belknap and Superintendent Smith have completed one of the best brick plants to be found anywhere in the west. Already the company is figuring on making large additions to the plant.

The Companies doing the work at Cazadero pay 50c an hour for a team and man, or \$5.00 a day.

Ed Miller has been at work on his residence the past week, and has finished it. The Miller home is now one of the cosiest and neatest cottages in town.

H. M. Looney of Currinsville was in town Monday and made The News a pleasant call. Last week he sold twentyfive of his young lambs and realized \$77 from them.

The employees of the brick plant and Messrs Smith and Jones of the wood factory were treated to a fine dinner at The Estacada, Wednesday evening by E. C. Belknap.

Havens & Green have secured a lease to the park pavilion from the O. W. P. for the winter, or until the summer season opens next year. They will give public dances in the place occasionally this winter.

The Firemen's Grand Second Annual Masquerade Ball takes place this evening in the Estacada Park pavilion. A large crowd is expected to be present and enjoy the event. The pavilion has been enclosed so that it will be an easy matter to keep the place comfortable and warm for the crowd.

A visit to the Dubois Lumber Company's plant a mile or so west of town is worth while. This is one of the most complete and well-constructed mills in the country. The donkey engines which were recently purchased to get the logs to the mill with are working fine, and enable the company to get their better grade of timber to the mill. An excellent quality of lumber is being turned out every day.

The Estacada Brick and Tile Company will be making brick now in a very short time. Last week it was discovered that heavy quantities of brick clay exist quite close to the factory. In their excavation work at the hill near the factory it was discovered that there is brick clay there in great quantity out of which red brick can be made. This clay is only a few feet from the factory and will be used to a great extent before the better quality of clay is brought down from the beds.

**Manager Belknap Is Toasted**

E. C. Belknap, vice-president and general manager of the Estacada Brick & Tile Co. was the recipient, Tuesday evening, of a very pleasant surprise. Late in the evening Supt. Charles Smith called at the Estacada and told Mr. Belknap that he was wanted at the brick factory. When they arrived there Mr. Belknap was surprised to see that Mr. Smith had the place nicely decorated and the table set with a sumptuous dinner. The city council and mayor were present and together they sat down and partook of the dinner while they were served by the employees of the company. Short speeches were made by Mayor Reed, Messrs Smith, Belknap, Surface and Haviland. After the dinner they repaired to the engine room and enjoyed some good cigars, and spatted stories. Next came the dinner to the boys who have been working for the company. They were waited on by Mr. Belknap who gave them an interesting talk. He outlined what the brick company wanted and expected to do and what they would expect of their employees. He said they were going to employ men with families as much as possible, and referred to Engineer Frank Morris and Mr. Johnson, their expert pressman, who has been assisting with the installing work. It was going to be their policy, Mr. Belknap said, to do everything possible to help build up the city, and that they were going to use every man as near right as possible. The party ended in the wee hours of Wednesday morning.
