Registration Begun

Registration of electors for the primary election, which will take place April 30, 1906, commenced Tuesday in the office of Co. Clerk, Fred W. Greenman, Oregon City. Notwithstanding any previous registration, all who want to vote next election must register again. The books will be kept open until May 15, at 5 o'clock. The last day for filing initiative petitions will be on February 3, and the number of signatures required to initiate laws or amendments is 7,489—Clackamas Cor. Portland Telegram.

Registration blanks will be in all the voting precincts in the county so that it will not be necessary to visit the county clerk's office to have your name registered. Any notary who has the blanks can register electors. However, there is an enormous lot of work in it for the clerk's office. Your signature must appear in the clerk's books, and if you do not visit the clerk's office personally, then your written signature must be pasted into the books, which is slow work. Register early.
