There is great need of a revision of the laws of Oregon relating to the publication of legal notices. Oregon is fifty years behind the times. The idea of posting election notices, for instance, when there are newspapers in the state to do such work, is a case in point. Fifty years ago, when there were no newspapers, or very few, in Oregon, the methods of today were to be excused; today, there is absolutely no excuse for such methods. There are countless other notices of a public character that the laws of the state should require the publication of. If Oregon is ever going to emerge from the frontier it is high time a beginning was made. The posting costs absolutely more than the publishing would. —More Observer.

Oregon is already out of the timber so far as frontier is concerned, but many of its laws should be revised so as to properly meet the conditions as they are today. The public of today look to the newspapers for all public news which relates to the public at large, and the public officials' business should be printed. Too much publicity in public matters cannot be given, and the public is always willing to pay for the information. A dollar's worth of publicity will often prevent many dollars lost in concealed graft.

In the Portland Journal of January 23, the Portland W. C. T. U. takes occasion to tell the people of the world of some horrible crimes alleged to be going on in Estacada. The article says the liquor laws are evaded here etc. etc. That the city officials permit flagrant violations of the laws regulating the saloons. That minors are permitted in the saloons and furnished liquor for the price. As is always the case with such articles, it is over-drawn and a mole hill is made into a mountain. May be a few minors go into the saloons, and may be some of them drink; but what is the use of a person who knows better saying that things go on here which would not be tolerated in Portland. Impossible! What is the use too, of offending a few hundred law-abiding citizens only to tell the Pacific Northwest that a boy was seen by someone to have entered a saloon. It is possible to have these law breakers corrected without outsiders interfering in the city papers. All that is needed is a little straightforward, honest and open business with the peace officers on the part of the complainants. Instead of hastening to the papers with their grievances these parents and W. C. T. U. people might better have the offenders of the law arrested and punished. The common council pleads innocence of any knowledge of the laws being violated. The News believes in the enforcement of all our criminal laws, but it must contend that no town is more orderly, and no citizens more peaceable than those of Estacada.

A full crew of public servants for the county is to be elected at the next election with exceptions of assessor and superintendent of schools. And there is not going to be a scarcity of candidates, no matter how difficult the formality of getting into office.

One hundred ninety-two applicants answered a want ad which appeared in the Oregon Journal one day last week. The ad was for a boiler-tender. This shows that there are a number of people in Portland who are looking for work.

The primary election law requires that you give your politics when you register, but when you take a ticket on election to vote you are privileged to vote for whatever and whom ever you please.

It might be said that since the appointment of the election officers the campaign is fairly on, and it is in order for those who are in the pot to see to it that they do not get burned.

### Will Unite To Elect County Commissioner

The East portion of Clackamas county is going to join forces and elect a county commissioner at the next election. The people in the various districts are to hold meetings this week and name two each of their number to meet later and decide on a person to support for the office. If a candidate can be decided on who will be entirely satisfactory to all districts, and one whom we will all support then his election will be assured. The meeting for Estacada will be held next Saturday for Estacada at 2 p. m.

Superintendent of Schools Zinser has discovered that there is such a place in Clackamas Co. as Estacada, and Tuesday he swooped down on the city and visited the schools. It was Mr. Zinser's first visit here since the school has been established and he was very agreeably surprised to see such excellent conditions prevailing in our schools, and in the growth of the place. Some selfish people might think from this that we could get along nicely without such an officer, but there are other duties than visiting schools connected with the office.

A Ladies' Aid Society was formed last week at a meeting held for that purpose, and twelve members were secured. The meetings will be held on the second and fourth Fridays in each month beginning with Feb. 9. Officers were elected as follows: Mrs. S. W. Irwin, Pres. Mrs. T. J. Reagan, V. Pres.; Miss Iva Dale, Sec.; Miss Gertrude Morrow, Treas.

The notary is paid by the county at rate of ten cents for each registration, providing the one who registers votes at the general election. So if you register and do not vote the officer gets no pay. Not much of a fortune in it for the registration officer.

County Judge Ryan has authorized the acceptance of \$750 by the estate of the late John Goebel of the O. W. P. & Ry. Co. in full settlement of the claim of the estate. Young Mr. Goebel lost his life last summer at Cazadero and his father who is 75 years old was quite dependent on his son for support. He gets the \$750.

He said that one man could not look after the work satisfactorily and that Multnomah county will keep him busy. He is of the opinion that Mr. Lewis is entirely competent to look after the work.

Manager Van Dyke of the Spring water Mill Company, reports that his mill is turning out great quantities of lumber now-days. Last week they shipped four cars of lumber to the Hazelwild Lumber company on the Mt. Scott line. The company has twenty-four men on its pay roll. This is more than any other mill in the country employs. The company is considering the proposition of putting in an electric light plant.

The largest incubator in the world, with a capacity of 15,000 eggs, has just been completed by W. P. Hall of Pembroke, New York. It is 102 feet long and 4 feet 4 inches wide. Partitions divide it into 100 compartments, each accommodating two trays. The trays have wire bottoms and hold 75 eggs each. To fill this incubator a single time with common, not thoroughbred, eggs would require an expenditure of \$6,000, for eggs of the requisite freshness would cost 40 cents a dozen. As one hen covers 15 eggs for hatching, the incubator does the work of 1,000 foxels, or has the capacity of one hen sitting constantly for 10 years.
