### Falls to His Death

A fatal accident happened at the headworks early Monday morning. W. C. Armstrong, of Portland was at work handling plank on the high platform near the dam, and while standing by the edge of the platform he made a misstep and fell off the platform. He fell 30 feet head-first striking his head on a heavy plank inflicting a wound several inches long and deep. Dr. Smith was called and on examining the man found that death had been instantaneous. He notified Coroner Holman, but that official being engaged Judge Livy Stipp and Attorney Clark came out and held an inquest. The death was found to be purely accidental, and the cause of it attached to no one. Mr. Armstrong was sixty years old and had been at work since December. Relatives of the deceased living in Portland were notified of the death and took the body in charge.
