Farmers' Telephone

W. H. Bonner, who recently sold his shingle mill near Logan, is now working in the interest of his telephone company. He is selling stock in the concern to farmers and others who feel interested in the undertaking. The company will be known as the Farm & Home Telephone Company, and will be run on a mutual basis. Mr. Bonner expects the stock holders to absorb all his interest so that it will be owned wholly by the people. In this way Mr. Bonner says the cost to the people for phones will be merely nominal. He thinks there will be considerable line extension made this year.

City Council

The city council held an interesting meeting Tuesday evening. E. C. Belknap who had been appointed councilman qualified and took office. E. S. Womer was appointed recorder, and has filed his bond. The treasurer appointment was left over. The interesting part of the meeting arrived when the minutes of the previous meeting came up for approval. Objection was made to having the petition of W. H. Heylman appear as a whole in the minutes. All that was required was to file the paper as a part of the business proceedings of the board. The objection was sustained, and a spirited discussion by Mr. Heylman and the council followed. Recorder Haviland took exceptions to the action of the council, and quit his job at once. Councilman Cary was appointed clerk pro tem. The salaries of recorder and marshal were put at \$5 a month instead of \$15.
