The district school board held a meeting this week and decided to proceed at once with the preliminary steps for building Estacada's new \$5,000 school house. It is calculated that work on the building can be started by the middle of May, when it is believed the rainy season will be sufficiently over with to allow the work to be done.

On Tuesday of this week E. F. Surface received notice from the postoffice department at Washington of his appointment to the position of postmaster at Estacada. Mr. Surface will assume the duties of the office as soon as his bond is accepted by the government, and he is notified of that fact. It is likely that Eva Kissler will remain in the office for sometime.

Winter weather, accompanied by a thick layer of snow, is so seldom experienced in this part of tropical America that last Monday was considered one of the strange freaks which nature sometimes produces. Down by the river in the lower part of the Willamette valley a three inch coat of snow covered the ground in the morning, but it disappeared on the low lands before noon time.

The name of Ralph W. Hoyt was omitted from the list of those we published last week who are running for the nomination of state treasurer on the republican ticket. It was an inadvertent error. Mr. Hoyt is a resident of Portland, and is cashier of the Merchants National Bank. He was treasurer of Multnomah county for two terms, and is well fitted for the place to which he aspires.

The city council had a quiet meeting Tuesday evening. The resignation of Major Wm. K. Haviland from the council was received and accepted. Wm. A. Jones was elected to fill the vacancy. H. Cooper was appointed city treasurer in place of John Page, who is going to lead a retired life. Recorder Womer got in his harness and performed his first official duties. Unless otherwise found necessary the board will meet every two weeks hereafter.

Charles Bloomer, aged 82 years, died in this city Monday, March 19, 1906. Mr. Bloomer came here last fall and built a home. During his short life among us he made many friends who extend their sympathy to his bereaved widow. Mr. Bloomer was a man of stern integrity and had no patience with dishonesty in any form. He was the oldest Mason in the county having joined a lodge in N. Y. state in 1846. He was a pioneer merchant at Spokane when there were but six buildings in the place. His remains were taken to Portland for burial. Mr. Bloomer leaves a widow, a sister, wife of Hon. D. F. Percival, a banker at Cheney, Wash., and an adopted daughter, Mrs. Moffett of Seattle.

There is upon the school house site one hundred and sixty dollars worth of dimension lumber belonging to said district, this must be purchased by the successful bidder.
