Yes, and the country surrounding Estacada is as good as the best in Oregon; land can be bought at a reasonable price, and there is no reason why the country should not keep up with the terminal city.

One week more before primary day, and the voter who goes into the voting booth before first making up his mind who he shall vote for will have a task on his hands, and may vote for someone he does not wish to. The ballot will be large and contain many names. It is but natural that this paper should take special interest in the candidates from its home part of the county. Dr. C. B. Smith for representative and F. J. Harkenrider for county commissioner are our only candidates in this part of the county, and we should like to see a good, majority vote cast for these men at the primary. And why shouldn't they receive it? Both are old citizens, competent, and known to nearly everyone. They are men of experience, have a wide acquaintance and can do more for us than can the stranger. We believe that now is the time for the East side to assert itself, and cast its ballot influence for its home candidates. In fact our rapidly growing wants and importance in the county demand the little recognition asked for at the approaching primary, April 20.

The petitioned remonstrance against the purchasing by the city of Estacada of the water system of the railway company has received the signatures of a great majority of the tax-payers of the city. This remonstrance has been filed with the city recorder, and will be read at the next meeting of the council, April 17. Considerable interest is shown in this controversy because the city has passed an ordinance authorizing

the purchase of the system, and the purchasing contract is ready for the officers' signatures. In the first place the owners of the water system made a proposition to sell to the city the system for \$5,773, and after much deliberation the city agreed to accept the offer, with a few changes and at a lower figure, providing arrangements could be made to convert it to a natural gravity system. This could not be done at once and so the owners of the plant agreed to include the pumping station at a price of \$7,000 and in this shape the bargain was to be closed. It is claimed that the system is not worth the \$7,000 asked for it; that it is poorly constructed; that \$4,000 will put in an adequate system for the city, and that we can not afford to buy it just at present. These things were talked of when negotiations first begun, but as it was said the company would shut down the plant if it could not be sold, and that it would not extend it to those who were clamoring for water, the council thought itself justified in buying the outfit at as low a price as possible. Bonds in the sum of \$10,000 were to be issued and the money used in extending the system about town, converting it to one of natural gravity and making other improvements.

The city must be supplied with water, and if the present owners of the water system will continue operating it and extend it, it would be better for the city not to purchase at present. And if the petitioners can show the council beyond a doubt that the price asked is much above the actual worth, then the negotiations ought to be broken off, otherwise the city should take over the plant. If a more economical course can be pursued than that already proposed by the council that should be the course taken. It is not probable that the plant would be shut down, it is not right for the city to pay more for the water system than it is worth. Who shall be the judges? A remonstrance from practically the whole people should receive due consideration. On the other hand it is said that the city should not subject itself to an expensive litigation by backing down on the deal.
