


If His Land Suffers from Drouth of Lacks Water for Irrigating When Small Stream Is Near,by Says Robert Washburn

Washington, April 30.—This was both a field day and a "seed" day in the house, the major portion of the legisla-tive session being given over to the consideration of the agricultural bill and, incident thereto, the free distri-bution of seeds, for which the bill does not provide, but which it is agreed will be restored to the bill. Eighteen pages of the agricultural bill were considered and perfected. The debate on the question of free seeds will be resumed tomorrow, when a vote is expected on the amendment to insert an appropriation of \$90,000 for the pur-chase and distribution of "rare and unnsual seeds." 


