The only important business transacted was a resolution which was introduced and passed annulling City ordinance No. 2. This ordinance was one granting to the Hotel Estacada a \$100-year liquor license. Liquor was to be sold as a table beverage only. The license will expire on June 1. All liquor licenses after this will be placed at \$500 a year.

A Road to George

Should the County Be Asked to Build the German Burn Road

How shall the people living east of here and north of Eagle Creek get a good road built so that it will be convenient for them to market their produce at Estacada? This question has been agitating the minds of the people for some time. A rich and well-settled country, peopled with a thrifty class of citizens lies to the north of Eagle creek and east of Estacada, and the creek cuts them out of a direct route to town. What is needed is a bridge and some grade work done on both sides of the creek. It is not an expensive undertaking, and is thought that if the people of Estacada and the Burn district would get together a plan for a road and the grading could be devised. As it is they are forced to drive considerable out of their way to get to town.

REPUBLICANS KEEP FAITH WITH PEOPLE

By Rigid Economy, County Indebtedness Is Reduced by \$200,000.00

Clackamas County Republicans have always been men of action. They have a habit of doing what they say they will. An appreciable confirmation of this statement is found by referring to county affairs with respect to the indebtedness of the county.

On March 31, 1906, the total outstanding indebtedness of the county was \$126,283.86. The amount of the county's obligations fluctuated from year to year, until on Sept. 30, 1903, the debt had reached \$144,900.83. In the campaign of spring of 1904 it will be remembered that retrenchments and reform were the main issues, and it was on a platform pledging these things that the entire republican ticket was successful in the election that followed in June.

As evidence of having kept faith with the people, the Republican party invites an investigation of the county's present financial standing. In presenting their ticket at this time, the republicans point with a great deal of satisfaction to the fact that the indebtedness of the county has been practically wiped out. This has been accomplished by judiciously applying the pruning knife and exercising the most rigid economy in the administration of the different departments of the county's government.

It is on this showing that the republicans expect to have the indorsement of the people at the polls next month.

All outstanding warrants indorsed prior to April 1, 1905, have been called in for cancellation. Since that time warrants for not to exceed \$31,000 have been issued. That amount, in reality, represents the actual indebtedness of the coun-

ty at this time. It is being contended that this reduction in the county's indebtedness has been accomplished at the expense of the road fund. Such is not the fact. The general fund and the road fund of the county are two separate and distinct funds. Instead of the road fund suffering at the expense of the general fund, the reverse is true. In the last few years several thousand dollars' worth of road machinery, including a road engine, several roadrollers, a rock-crusher and a dozen roadgraders, have been purchased, and all of this expense has been paid for out of the general fund.

AN OPEN LETTER

To the Voters of Oregon, Greeting: Gentlemen:—

The undersigned submit to you a few of our reasons for asking you to ratify, by your affirmative votes, the amendment granting equal rights to women, which has been placed before the voters by a petition numerously signed by the men of Oregon under the initiative and referendum.

This movement has grown under your management from the small beginning known as the "Married Woman's Sole Trader Bill" enacted by your legislative assembly in '72, until it has reached such vast proportions as to attract the attention of the civilized world. A constitutional amendment proposing women's enfranchisement, submitted to you in '84 brought us an affirmative vote of 11,226. This amendment was again submitted to your suffrages by legislative initiative in 1900 bringing us a vote of 26,265. Although the population of the big commercial centers had more than doubled in 16 years, the "No" vote was only increased 226, while the "Yes" vote was augmented 15,042. This, to us, is a palpable augury of the triumph which we confidently look to you to consummate for us on the 4th of June by placing "X" between "302" and "Yes" on your ballots. Do this and you will honor our flag of truce, the only power we can offer in our defense against the balloted forces of the opposition. Do this, and you will honor Oregon, your mothers and yourselves. And your petitioners will ever pray.
