It has been figured out that the receipts of the Oregon City post-office for the year ending June 30 will exceed \$10,000 which will entitle the postmaster at that place of a raise of \$1,000 a year in his salary. He gets \$2,200 a year.

The district school board held a business meeting Tuesday evening. Eight applications were received by the board from teachers. Prof. J. E. Stubbs was elected as principal, and Miss Mae Stephens of Brownsville was chosen as teacher of the intermediate and primary room.

The Estacada Brick & Tile company began Tuesday to make brick at its factory. Superintendent Halkins says he is going to make from 15,000 to 20,000 brick a day now. They have plenty of clay at hand, and it is in fine condition. They are filling the new drying sheds each of which will hold about 70,000 brick.

District School Meeting

The district school meeting took place at the school house Monday evening. Director John Stormer presided. School Clerk John F. Lovelace read the proceedings of the board which were accepted, and also the regular annual financial report of the district. T. J. Reagan and C. F. Howe were placed in nomination for director, and the voted stood, Howe 19 and Reagan 14. J. F. Lovelace was re-elected clerk by a unanimous vote. A five mill tax on the school district's assessed valuation—\$100,625.00—for incidental running expenses and to pay interest on the school bonds.
