Crushed to Death By A Rock
Last Friday afternoon while at work near the dam at Cazadero Albert Meisner was crushed to death by being caught beneath a rock that slid down the canyon side. Meisner was fortyone years of age and was a resident of George where he owned a farm. Coroner Holeman, Supt. Boynton, and Dr. Smith went up to Cazadero Saturday and an inquest was held. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death, and the blame of the accident was not fixed.

Meisner was a single man, and at the time of his death he and another laborer were working on the side of the hill dirt and stone from which were being scrapped down into the dam. He was releasing large rock and rolling them down the hill, and had not noticed a large boulder that came rolling down the hill, and he was caught and crushed beneath it. The rock weighed about two tons. Meisner had no relatives living here and the remains were taken to Oregon City and buried.

John G. Epperson
Died, June 13, 1906, at the home of his sister, Mrs. Dock Palmateer, in Garfield, John G. Epperson, age 41 years, 2 months and 22 days after an illness of four weeks. He was born in Douglas county near Roseburg, and was the youngest of a family of 11 children 6 of whom survive him, namely Marion of Bucoda, Ira of Anacortes, Wash., Henry Epperson and Emma Palmateer of Garfield, George Epperson of Sandy Ridge and Nancy Myers of Dodge, all of whom were present during his illness and death. He had every care loving hands and hearts could bestow during his illness but to avail. The reaper had marked him for its prey. He was laid beside his parents, Gilbert and Cathrine Epperson, pioneers, in the Sandy Ridge cemetery, near the old home where he had spent his childhood and life helping to make this part of Oregon habitable. He was one of three brothers, George and Henry, being the promoters in inducing capital to build the O W P line in here thus developing this country. Many were the hardships he endured while working for the Oregon Water Power & Ry. Co. He was noted for his honesty and integrity. Beloved by all who knew him.
