Building operations were started, Monday, on the new burning dry kiln at the Estacada Brick & Tile Company's factory. Mr. Nadolni is one of the best experts in the country on the building of common brick dry kilns, and it was only by fortune that his services were secured here. The kiln is to be 14x40 inside, and the walls are to be lined with fire brick. It is considered one of the best make of brick kilns.

Indict J. W. Reed.

J. W. Reed who is at work for the O. W. P. & Ry. Co. at The Oaks has been indicted by the grand jury of the City of Portland on the charge of inducing voters to vote in a precinct outside of that of their own. The indictment was reached Monday. Jewelry and Furniture Stores Robbed

Estacada has had its first case of burglary. Last Monday morning when Merchant Cooper and Jewelry Johnson went to open up their places of business they discovered that their stores had been robbed. The robbery had been committed sometime during the night. How an entrance to the building was affected is not understood, for it was securely locked. However, the back door to the building was found open in the morning, but whether entrance was gained through this way or not is not known. The back window was left open during the night and the thief undoubtedly entered thru it. The articles stolen from Mr. Johnson included several watches, chains, and some trinkets. A gold watch, one gold case and several silver watches were left undisturbed in the case. The fellow made a thorough search of the store but took only a telescope and small stuff of very little value belonging to Cooper & Co. The robbery is thought to have been done by some transient who had come out with the Sunday crowd.
