Mrs. T. J. Mathews Dead

Mrs. Pamela Mathews died last Sunday at 2 p. m. Mrs. Mathews had been sick with a hma forseveral years, and had been living for the past year with her son, John's family, in Portland. She had partly recovered from her sickness, and was up and around, when last week she suddenly took worse. Deceased was married to Thomas J. Mathews in Tennessee, and they moved to Oregon and settled near where Estacada now is in 82. They have lived here ever since. THE FOURTH IN ESTACADA

Between Five and Six Thousand People Visit the City
