Canada Thistles

The dear little prickly pet of the farmer and land owner generally, the Canada thistle, is making its undesirable presence known in this county. County Judge Grant B. Dimick was in Estacada last Saturday and had with him a fine, large specimen of this thistle pest, which he had got at Barlow. There are very few places where it is found, and with a little precaution and labor it can be stamped out. It is easily distinguished from the common Bull thistle as its leaves are smaller and curly. We have not heard of any around Estacada, but if any are here they should be destroyed at once.

In speaking of the thistle, Judge Dimick said: "I found enough Canadian thistles in the vicinity of Haley on the line of the O. W. P. & Ry. Co. to seed the entire eastern part of the county."

The law in regard to this pest, authorizes the county court to notify property owners to destroy these thistles, and in event of failure to do so, the road supervisor is empowered to proceed with the work of destruction and the expense of the same becomes a lien on the property.

Man Who Robbed Jewelry Store Caught

A young fellow named Miller has been arrested and lodged in jail at Oregon City on a charge of horse-stealing. The man gives his name as Frank Miller. He is the same fellow who, on the night of June 24 entered the H. Cooper furniture store in Estacada and stole a lot of jewelry belonging to A. N. Johnson and some articles belonging to Mr. Cooper. From here Miller started across the country South towards Molalla, slowly passing through the country, making thefts wherever an opportunity offered. At one place near Molalla he stole a rifle, a suit of clothes and several dozen eggs. For this act he was arrested and put in jail but broke out during the night, stole a horse of the constable and started to make his escape. At Liberal, Wm. Morey, armed with a shotgun, accosted Miller and commanded him to halt, but the youth coolly produced a revolver and told his would-be captor not to interfere. Later he ran across C. E. Spence & Fred Spangler, both armed with rifles, who surprised the young desperado and he was forced to submit to arrest. He has admitted all the crimes and will be held for trial. Tuesday, Mr. Johnson received word from Oregon City that the fellow who robbed his jewelry stand had been arrested. Miller admitted he stole the goods and produced all he had yet with him. Some of it he had traded away, sold or given away, but Mr. Johnson will recover all the stolen articles—six watches, several chains, brooches etc.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

The city council convened Tuesday evening, Councilmen Stratton, Cary and Jones, and Mayor Reed being present. A few small bills and the June salaries of the marshal and recorder were allowed. The marshal was instructed to go ahead and collect the poll and dog taxes. The street improvement subject was talked over and it was decided that Broadway should be improved from the railroad to the north side of Third street. The kind of pavement to be used will be decided on later. However, these two blocks will be Macadamized, and if the cost is not too great asphalt or cement finish will be used. Curbed sides are to be put in. It is proposed that the city at large shall pay one third the cost and the balance be paid by the property owners whose property abuts on the improved part of the street.
