Portland is trying to be big and  
saucy like other cities by threaten-  
ing a street car strike.

The forest reserve of the United  
States has been increased in the last  
two years from 50,000,000 to 100,  
000,000 acres. This area is as large  
as all of New England and the mid-  
dle states with Maryland and Vir-  
ginia thrown in. Oregon has contrib-  
uted a large part of the forest  
reserve.

President Hill of the Great Nor-  
thern has been on the Coast several  
weeks telling the cities what they  
should do about railroad building.  
Mr. Hill has done a great deal for  
the "Northwest" and he has been  
well paid for his work. The first  
thing looked for now by the great  
railway companies is terminal facil-  
ities, and the interior has to wait.

Secretary Hitchcock wants to put  
Senator Fulton in jail because the  
Senator in a moment of inadvertence  
or anger, or frankness, declared  
that the Secretary was in his dotage.  
It was an indiscreet and, we think,  
unjust remark, but it is difficult  
to see why the Senator should be  
jailed for it. He cannot be, of course,  
for there is no such thing as lese  
majeste in this country; at least the  
courts do not recognize it. There-  
fore the unfortunate Senator is to be  
put behind the bars for something  
else, if possible. The something  
else is land frauds or any other  
indictable frauds.

The Government theory of the  
situation of Oregon is that land  
frauds and public office-holding in  
this state synonymous and insepa-  
rable. We will not say that this  
notion, which has been applied to  
Oregon affairs with startling and  
disastrous results, has not had  
not had some basis in truth; but  
we will say that, so far as been ob-  
servable, the Government has never  
had any intention of exempting Sen-  
ator Fulton from the practical ap-  
plication of its ideas and informa-  
tion about Oregon, and that he  
would long ago have been in the  
same boat with other members of  
the Oregon delegation if there had  
been reason or occasion to put him  
there. At least we suppose so. But  
of course we shall have to wait  
and see. The end is not yet.  
The possibilities of the Hitchcock  
fine-tooth comb are numerous, and  
we may be sure that Senator Fulton  
will not feel that it will be perfectly  
easy, to keep out of the way merely  
because he thinks that Secretary  
Hitchcock is in his dotage. If we

are not mistaken the Senator was  
once seen in the very act of scan-  
ning earnestly and minutely and in  
a most suspicious manner a map of  
the unappropriated lands of Oregon.

The city council has caused to be  
posted the following street improve-  
ment notice:—

Notice is given of intended street  
improvement on Broadway from the

of No. 1 and cement the whole to  
be thoroughly rolled and packed.

crete curb and gutter.

The public's attention has been

First, that owners or occupants  
of lots in said city remove all rub-  
bish, manure piles, garbage, refuse  
and other substances injurious or  
liable to become injurious to health,  
and put all lots, barns, vaults, and  
out houses in good sanitary con-  
dition, such work to be done at once  
and finished by the 25th of July  
and such owner or occupant of lots  
is hereby notified that after July 25  
the city will enter upon all premises  
not so cleaned and put same in san-  
itary condition at the expense of the  
owner or occupant.

Second, that the slaughter of an-  
imals of any sort within the said  
city is prohibited according to ordi-  
nance 21, and all people hereafter  
found disobeying this ordinance will  
be prosecuted without further no-  
tice to the fullest extent of the law.
