Estacada's New Public School to Be Completed

The school board has let a contract to Al Lindsey to finish the new school now in course of construction. Mr. Lindsey's first contract did not include finishing the two upper rooms, but since the school funds would be sufficient it was thought best to have the building completed at once. The additional cost is \$665. The first contract was for \$4,271 which will place the cost of the building at \$4,936.

Educational Notes

The regular examination of applicants for certificates to teach in Clackamas county commenced yesterday at Oregon City. County school Supt. Zinsler is being assisted by Prof. Gary of Willamette, and Prof. Read of Parkplace. A large number of teachers is present.

Of the 120 school districts in the county, 40 of them have made application for their books to be given out by the state library commission. Estacada has \$9 worth of these new books coming.

Clackamas county will get \$14,443 from the state school fund this year which is \$531 more than it received last year.
