**Oregon Game Laws**

Spotted fawn—Closed at all the times.  
Buck deer, moose, and mountain sheep—Closed from Nov. 1 of each year to Aug. 15 of the following year.  
Female deer—Closed from Nov. 1 of each year to Sept. 15 of following year.  
Night hunting and the use of the dog for deer or moose prohibited at all times.  
Limit—Five deer in one season.  
Elk—Closed until September 15, 1907.  
It is unlawful to sell any elk meat at any time.  
It is unlawful at any time to hunt deer, elk, mountain sheep, or spotted fawn for the purpose of obtaining the hide, horns, hams or other flesh for the purpose of barter except upon the permission from the state game or forestry warden.  
Ducks, geese, swan—Closed between the first day of Feb. and the first day of Sept. Limited to 50 in one week.  
Water rail and upland plover—Closed from Jan. 1 to Aug. 1.  
Pheasants—East of the Cascades closed at all times.  
Sage hen, sage cock, grouse or native pheasant—Closed between Dec. 1 and Aug. 15.  
Quail—Closed except between the second Saturday and third Tuesday of Sept. Limit, 6 in a day, 12 in a week.  
It is unlawful to hunt without a license which must be obtained of the county clerk and carried while hunting. Resident fee for license, \$1; nonresident, \$10.  
Trout—Closed during Nov. Dec. Jan. Feb. and March. Unlawful to keep trout less than 5 inches long. Night fishing prohibited. Limit, 125 in one day.
