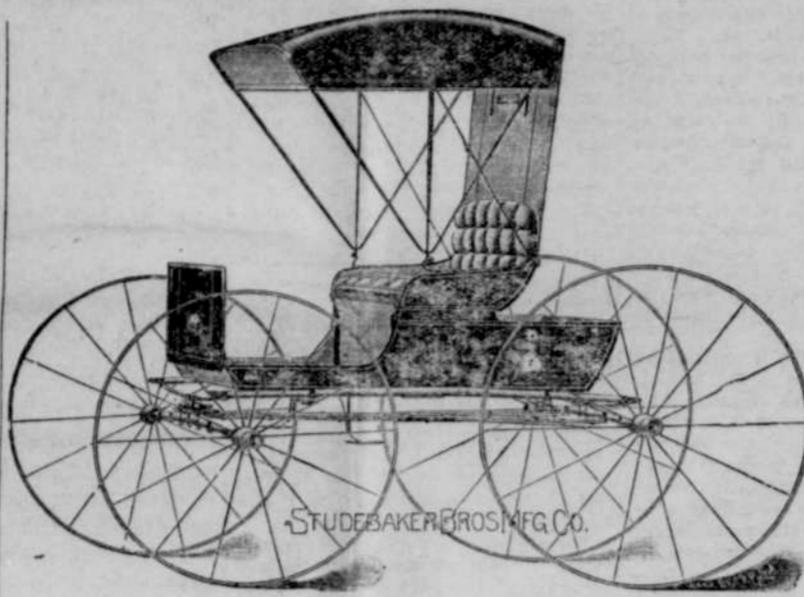

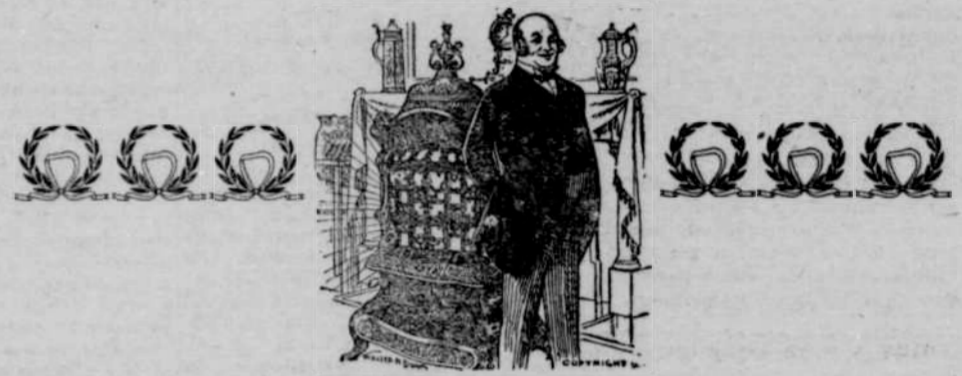

Water and fire are as unlike each other as it is possible to have them. Yesterday this vicinity was visited by a copious rain. Just four years ago a destructive fire swept through here. A great difference. The fire brought sorrow and fear. The rain pleased the majority. Four years ago many of the farmers near here lost about everything they had of worldly effects. Homes and barns, orchards and fences, grain and feed passed away in flames. The loss was great. But a stranger passing

through, and observing the farm homes, and ranches would not think the country had recently been devastated by fire. The great improvement speaks well for the thrift of our people, and the possibilities of the country.

Oregon's coal production the last year was 109,641 tons of the value \$282,495 according to the report of the Geological survey department. The previous year the production was 111,540 tons.

All America is growing. There is a remarkable increase of railway traffic in New York City. Each month this year there have been 100,000 more fares collected than during the corresponding month of last year, and 6,000,000 more transfers have been issued.

Grapes Crop Light

In the 8-acre field of Mr. Reid at Milwaukie, the largest and finest in the state, there will this year be a half a crop. Mr. Reid has ordered 3,000 baskets, whereas in former years he usually got 7,000. The shortage is caused by cold, frosty weather. His field was cultivated with unusual care, and for the first time the grape vines were sprayed. The fruit this year will be of a fine quality and large. This is one of the model vineyards of the Oregon, and is in a remarkably clean and healthy condition.
