John T. Davis Held Up And Shot

No one would call it a Kentucky or wild plains hold-up. There was too much of a peculiar tameness about it all. But it was much too serious as it was. Last Sunday as John T. Davis was walking along the railroad track this side of Eagle Creek he met a fellow who stopped him and at the point of a 22-caliber rifle ordered him to throw up his hands and let himself be relieved of his valuables. Mr. Davis was not used to the fellow's style and he became excited and was slow in raising his hands. The gun was discharged and the bullet took effect in the fleshy part of Mr. Davis's right breast inflicting only a slight wound. The hold-up man took to his heels and disappeared as quickly as possible without waiting to take the valuables, and see developments. Davis walked on up to the mill at Alspaugh Crossing and gave the alarm. His friends here took care of him until the arrival of Dr. Smith from Estacada on the 9:30 car. The wounded man was placed on the car and taken to his home at Lantz. Mr. Davis is a carpenter and was working for the Eagle Creek Lumber Company at the big mill at Alspaugh. He was on his way to the station to take the next car home to spend the day with his family when he met the timid bandit. Manager Linderman of the firm of Bohm & Linderman, owners of the sawmill, came to Estacada, secured a doctor and telephoned the sheriff at Oregon City of the affair. Sheriff Beatie came over to investigate but what he could learn about it was too meager to give him any clue to work on, and he returned home. Mr. Davis described his assailant as a short dark man wearing a tan colored coat, and having the appearance of a Dago. It is not likely that anything will be done in the matter, or that the criminal will be caught.
