The Clackamas River Spanned By Two Suspension Bridges

There are not many suspension bridges in Oregon. We think four is all there are. One at Oregon City, one at Dillard and two at Cazadero. The one at Oregon City spans the Willamette and has cost Clackamas county several thousand dollars. The one at Dillard was constructed and is maintained by a number of enterprising citizens as a foot bridge over the Umpqua river. The two near here are private property of the General Electric Light & Power Company building the big power plant at Cazadero. One of these connects the banks of the old and picturesque Clackamas at the power house and transmitting station. It is a foot bridge and is a strong, well-constructed piece of engineering. The main cables are of 1 1/2 inch wire and are strung over concrete piers and fastened at the ends into under-ground concrete pillars. It is used a great deal by the workmen, in fact it is an absolute necessity. The other bridge is at the dam and connects both ends of the dam. It is built similar to the lower bridge.
