Dr. Simeon Smith

Died, December 9, Simeon Smith aged 86 years, at 472 East Pine St. Portland, cause engine pectoris.

Dr. Simeon Smith, who died on Sunday, December 9, was an old resident of Portland where he practiced medicine for many years. He came here from New York. The doctor was a well-preserved man both physically and mentally for one of his age, but for some time he had been failing in health. Dr. C. B. Smith, of Estacada, his only son, was in Portland, Saturday to see him. Dr. Smith spent the day with his father, and the latter upon the son's leaving for Estacada seemed bright and cheerful. But before he reached home the sad news of his father's death was phoned him.

Dr. Simeon Smith was born in Dutchess county, N. Y. At the age of 18 he bought his time of his father. At this age he had received no education, but at once started to acquire a school training at Ovid Academy, and afterwards took up the study of medicine at the Buffalo Medical College from which he graduated later. He came to Oregon in 1879 and located in East Portland, where he practiced medicine for 29

years, being one of the oldest practitioners in the state. The funeral services were held in Oregon City, Tuesday and the remains were interred in Mountain View cemetery beside those of Mrs. Smith, who preceded him to the other side some 15 years. At the grave Judge G. E. Hayes made a short address reviewing the life of the deceased. The pallbearers were selected from among Dr. Smith's personal friends and were, Ex-Senator G. C. Brownell, Judge G. E. Hayes, Attorney J. U. Campbell, C. C. Babcock, J. C. Bradley and County Judge Grant B. Dimick. The deceased was an uncle of C. D. and D. C. Latourette of Oregon City. A large number of friends and relatives met at the cemetery to pay their respects to one who had lived an honorable and useful life among men.
