While Great Britain as a rule escapes winter weather, she has suffered this year to an almost unprecedented degree. According to reports tonight from northern points, the storm is growing worse. The heavy snowstorms which began several days ago still continue. They are accompanied by violent gales and even thunder storms in some places, and have resulted in a serious railroad accident near Arborath, Scotrailroad ac ident near Arborath, Scotland, in which about 50 persons were killed or suffered serious injury.

The telegraphic services are disorganized and would be completely useless but for the extension in recent years of the underground wires. The snowstorms continue with equal severity in Northern Wales and in Ireland.


