The Estacada State Bank has been purchased by a company of prominent bankers of the City of Portland. The transfer of the bank property and business took place on Monday of this week. President Reed, Vice-President Vocum and Cashier Stratton, who were the incorporators of this institution, have sold all their interest in it to the new owners. The bank will be reorganized at once with a capital stock of \$20,000.00, fully paid up. Mr. E. L. Fraley is the new cashier. Mr. Fraley comes to Estacada

for the large mill firm of Davis & Davis at Boring.

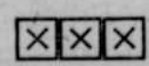
