Cazadero Plant to Be Duplicated

A second monster plant, duplicating the Cazadero plant or Station A. will be erected by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. on the Upper Clackamas, two miles and a half above the Cazadero powerhouse. The new plant will have a capacity of 25,000 horsepower, equaling that of the Cazadero plant when working to its full capacity.

Plans have been definitely made for the new power station and a gang of men has been put to work clearing the land along both sides of the Clackamas and making surveys for the dam. The new plant will cost about \$750,000 and will require about four years for completion.

There is said to be a splendid waterpower in the Clackamas two miles and a half above Cazadero. Conditions are somewhat different than those prevailing at the power station just completed and the dam to be built to develop the power at the upper station will be higher than the one blocking the river at Cazadero. A fall of 125 feet will be obtained, giving a tremendous rush through the turbine wheels.

The dams will have the same capacity as the Cazadero reservoir, which, once filled, holds enough water to create 25,000 horse power for five hours without requiring the flow of the river.

The Cazadero plant, now completed, has cost \$1,000,000. The second power station above Cazadero, which will practically be a duplicate of the first, will not cost so much because the pole lines into Portland for transmission of power are already erected and will be used for the second plant, while the railroad to Cazadero is completed and is owned by the same interests which are building the power plant, making the construction of the new station less expensive than the first.

"Work has been commenced clearing the ground and surveying for the new power plant," said President Goode, of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. "Work will proceed steadily. We plan to have the new power dam and station completed in about four years at the end of which time the Cazadero plant will probably be used to capacity."

The station to be erected above Cazadero will develop 25,000 horse power. The two plants on the upper Clackamas will manufacture 50,000 horsepower, which will probably take care of every requirement of Portland for the next ten years. The Cazadero plant is now completed and will be started Tuesday February 26. It will generate 15,000 horsepower for the present and additional current up to 25,000 can be generated in the same station by

the addition of a few machines which will be installed as they are required.

The finishing touches are now being applied to the Cazadero plant and the machines are being turned over to test the installation. On February 26 the formal opening of the station will occur and the dynamo will be hooked on to the city system. The Portland Railway, Light & Power Company will take a number of city and state officials and Portland business men to Cazadero as guests to witness the opening of the plant. Governor Chamberlain and Mayor Lane will be invited and as many will be taken as can be cared for conveniently. Special cars will be run, and the guests given an opportunity to inspect the plant.—Morning Oregonian.
