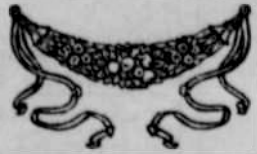

## \$5,000.00 For Park Improvements

The park grounds between the Clackamas river and the city are to be improved this year. One of the head officials of the railway company while in Estacada recently made the statement that it was the intention of the company to expend \$5,000 in fixing up and beautifying the Estacada park, and that the work would be begun early in the spring. The sum will not be any too much. The park is naturally situated for a very beautiful pleasure grounds, but it will require a lot of work and time to make such. It will take some time to clear out the down timber, stumps and brush. If the railway company wants to add something to the park that will be a popular convenience, it might span the river somewhere in the park limits with a suspension foot bridge.

### Mrs. Agnes Wirtz

T. J. Wirtz was called to Forest Grove last week because of his mother's death. A special to the Oregon Journal says: Mrs. Agnes Wirtz, aged 72, who died in this city Saturday after an illness of over 3 years, was buried at Verboort Monday. She was the last survivor of a family of 11. Her maiden name was VieHoeven. She was born in Cologne, Germany; came to America with her parents in 1848, settling in Waukesha, Wis. In 1851 she was married to John Jacob Wirtz and in 1878 they came to Oregon, locating in Washington county, and she had lived almost continuously since in Forest Grove. Her husband died in 1892.

Mrs. Wirtz was the mother of nine big stalwart boys, who were the pride of her heart. The nine boys at one time organized a baseball team and claimed the baseball championship of the United States for a family team. They are: Alvin, of Mountaineer; M. Joseph, of Portland; John Henry, A. Jacob, John Jacob, Peter Robert, and E. R., of this city; John Theodore, of Estacada, and William Joseph, of Gresham.

## Cheese Factory Meeting

A Public Meeting Will be Held in Estacada on Saturday March 9 to Start the Cheese Factory Going

The cheese factory proposition for Estacada will be discussed and settled at a meeting of the farmers and business men to be held in Estacada next Saturday, March 9th. The meeting has been called for 1:30 o'clock p. m. The object of the meeting is to call everybody who is interested, or liable to become interested, together and to arrive at a definite understanding about what can and will be done, both by the farmers and the Hazelwood Cream Company who intends putting the factory in here. Considerable work has been done by the Hazelwood Cream Company through its agent, F. C. Watson, to interest the people in the factory proposition, and most of the farmers have agreed to patronize the factory, and to add many more cows to their present herds. At the meeting Saturday, the Hazelwood Cream Company will explain what it expects to do, and it will expect to have some assurance from the people of their support. It all depends on what is done by mutual agreement between the company and the cow owners as to the capacity of the factory that the company will put up. The factory will be owned and operated by the Hazelwood people, and all that is expected of the farmers is sufficient milk and cream. Mr. A. H. Lea of the company will be here and will tell what they will do. It is the intention to have three carriers, each to start from the farther end of the route and come to town each day. Everyone should make a special effort to be at the Saturday meeting, for it depends on the action taken then whether or not we shall have a cheese factory.
