Many remarkable things appear in the last annual report of the Secretary of Agriculture. The farm products of 1906 had a farm value of \$6,800,000,000 half a billion over 1905 and in excess of two billions more than the productions of the census year 1900. Corn stays by far the most valuable crop, estimated at \$1,100,000,000 while cotton, next on the list, including seed was worth to its growers \$640,000,000. This King Corn knocks out King Cotton and becomes easily, "monarch of all he surveys." Hay is third at \$600,000,000 wheat at \$450,000,000; oats \$300,000,000; and potatoes \$150,000,000.—American Farmer.

## TO BUILD CHEESE FACTORY

### The Hazelwood Company Decide to Build in Estacada

The mass meeting of the farmers and business men held last Saturday to decide on what can be done towards the support of a cheese factory was very well attended. The meeting was presided over by President E. L. Fraley and Clerk A. N. Johnson of the club. The Hazelwood Company was represented by its agents who told the people just what the company will do. Several of the farmers, Messrs. Sailing, Millard, Duus, Harkenrider, Bard, Steinman, Lovell, Hale, Calif, Palmateer, Howe and Stormer spoke on the subject. It was finally decided that there was enough encouragement behind the project to justify the company putting in a factory that can be used for either cheese or butter. As a site for the factory the company has decided on lots 1, 2 and 3 in block 36, near the railway track in the Southeast part of town. The cost of the factory will be about \$2,000 and work on it is to begin at once.

The greatest obstacle in the way seemed to be the country roads but even they may be overcome and improved. The plan to be adopted by the company is to make cheese during part of the year and butter the rest of the year. This plan is the one which may suit most of the patrons, and may be the most profitable.
