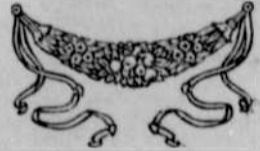

Cheese Factory Work Has Been Started On Factory

The Hazelwood Cream Company started work Monday on its Estacada cheese factory. Contractor W. W. Boner secured the carpenter work. The main building is 24x60 one story. The inside finishing will not be done till next fall, and only that which will be necessary to run during the summer months.

Woodworking Factory Goes 23rd

The woodworking factory which was started by the Estacada Wood Manufacturing Company is to be sold at private sale on March 23rd. The factory has been in the hands of a receiver for over a year, but it is announced that Receiver Sabin will clean the case up on the 23rd if the creditors are willing. The factory has cost a small fortune. It has been one of the best industries in the city, and has made some money for those who operated it. Several mill men are after the plant and it may be turned into a general furniture factory. This would be the best thing that could be done with it if a change is to be made. A few small pieces of machinery would have to be added. The factory could be worked to advantage in connection with some of the saw-mills near here, and it is hoped that the plant will soon be running at full capacity.

Council Doings

The village board of councilmen met in an adjourned session Tuesday evening. In addition to the ordinary business, a petition signed by Messrs. Seymour, Marchbank, Posson, Shutter, Baker, Rudolph and Stright was presented asking that the city cause sidewalks to be built on the west side of Zobrist St. between 7th and 8th, on the north side of 7th between Broadway and Zobrist, and to connect with the walk on Broadway. The petition was granted and an ordinance passed authorizing the construction of the new walk. Chief Al. Havens of the fire department appeared and asked permission for the department to move the bell tower and fire apparatus from the present location over on the town hall lot. The permission was granted. Bids for paving the streets were opened and that of Al Lindsey's being the only one received he was awarded the contract at \$11,800. His bid was accompanied by a certified check for \$1,180. Council adjourned till the 26th.

Amends Its Articles

The Estacada State Bank has filed supplementary articles of incorporation with the county clerk, increasing the capital stock of the corporation and changing its duration of business.

The articles were filed by Geo. Estes, S. W. Stryker and E. L. Fraley and provide for the character of the business to be transacted by the bank, and the location of the institution in Estacada, although the stockholders' office is to be in Portland. The institution will engage in a general banking and trust business, and the capital stock is placed at \$20,000 divided into shares of \$100 each.
