Strangers are beginning to arrive in the city and to "look around." These people are after new homes, speculation opportunities, or they are out "seeing" the country. It matters not what they are here for, when you meet them tell them the pleasant and good features of the country, of its luscious fruit, its big grain yields, its excellent water, soil and timber; its fine stock and wonderful vegetable productions, of the healthful climate, and the beautiful flowers, and never-ending, wondrous grand scenery. The knocker sitting over there with his feet dangling from a beer keg, and his business slow for want of personal attention and thriftiness, is anxious to tell of the drawbacks.

If the railway company intends making improvements to its property in Estacada this season, why shouldn't a new depot be one of the first of these improvements? The public and the large crowds that come out in the summer time would appreciate a commodious and comfortable depot with the necessary public conveniences.

The board of councilmen met on Tuesday evening but nothing of importance was done. E. F. Surface appeared before the board and asked for permission to widen the walk on the South side of his business property to eight feet. All the others on Second St. will change their walks from six to eight feet.

Street Improvement

Notice has been published in this paper for the past several weeks of the proposed street improvement in Estacada. The preliminaries in the work have been gone through with and the city council has let the contract for the sum of \$11,200. Main, Broadway, and two blocks of Second street are to be paved full width. Two blocks of Second and one of Third are to have 20-foot drives. The cost is to be assessed against the abutting property. The cost to each inside lot will be about \$80. and to corner lots from \$150 to \$350. These figures are approximate but are near the right sum. There was some opposition by some of the owners of corner lots to the proposition because of the high price, and injunction proceedings were about to be started, but the opposition seems to have died out.

The Proposed New Bridge

A petition will soon be out, if it is not already out, asking the board of county commissioners for a new bridge over the Clackamas river at Estacada. The old structure which has been in use for a number of years, has been thought some time to be unsafe for real heavy loads. The new bridge will be put in about 70 rods down the river at a point where the river banks are not very far apart. The road from here will enter town and cross the track just south of the Jones livery and up Second street. To the south the road will follow the small stream that flows down from DuBois' mill to the plank road. In view of the opinion that it will take from \$500 to a \$1,000 to repair the old bridge it is considered best to put in a new one that will last indefinitely. There will be opposition on the ground of too much expense and that with \$1,000 the old road could be used for ten years longer.

Cazadero Line May Be Extended Beyond Dam

Negotiations are being conducted by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. for right-of-way for the extension of its line of the OWP system beyond the power dam at Cazadero. The extension is intended for logging purposes, and at the end of the line a derrick will be installed so logs can be handled out of the stream on to the cars.

Backwater from the dam forms a pond that extends up stream a distance of three miles. Considerable timber is standing along the river above the plant, which is owned by mill concerns located along the railway line. By having the right to float the timber down stream and into the pond the millmen expect to get a most desirable class of material.—Evening Telegram.
