W. J. Bryan has a great deal to say on anything that comes up but this is one of the most sensible things he has ever uttered:

"I am glad to see this question agitated. I am sanguine enough to believe that this struggle over accepting money which has been amassed by questionable means will yet be settled on the side of morality. I believe the time is coming when great educational institutions will refuse to give respectability to great criminals by going into partnership with them. We are too prone to measure morality at the door of the penitentiary. We forget that there are many criminals outside prison doors."

### Plastic Repressed Brick to be Made

Developing and improvement operations under the direction of Superintendent S. J. Plant, are steadily going on at the Estacada Brick & Tile Works. Preparations are being made at the plant to make plastic repressed brick. New machinery for this purpose has been ordered for some time from the factory at Bucyrus, Ohio. This new machinery will be installed in part of the large clay shed, and the present engine and boiler will be used for power. The full capacity will be 30,000 plastic repressed brick a day, although it is expected that the works will be run on a 20,000 daily scale. Summer drying sheds about 130 by 150 are being built for natural drying purposes. The additions to the works are costing the owner, Fred S. Morris, about \$60,000. Plastic repressed brick are in great demand for large building purposes and where a finished article is required. They are said to be more durable, and to stand more pressure than the pressed brick. Mr. Plant considers the clay in the bluff adjoining the factory an excellent material for making these brick, and there is almost an unlimited supply of it. Should work proceed without any delay the factory may be running in two months

Farmers find many curious things happening around them every day which they can not understand, and nobody, even the scientists, can explain for them. Why, for instance does a horse strain a drink of water through its lips? Why does a cow poke her entire face into the bran mash, eat all she can, then lick her nostrils with her tongue? Why does the chicken drink exactly opposite to the horse or cow, having to hold its head up when it swallows a drink of water? Then the pigeon, of the same feathered family, as it keeps its bill immersed while drinking. But a dog laps the water in its mouth. This animal, moreover, never chews its food, while the cat, his companion household pet, always chews thoroughly before swallowing. How is it that failing to masticate does not hurt a dog, but with all other animals, including man, unchewed food causes dyspepsia? Why has a cow a cud and why can a horse shiver its hide to drive away flies? These questions show that we do not know it all.—American Farmer.

The Oregon City correspondent to the Portland Evening Telegram says:

Superintendent O'Malley, of the United States Bureau of Fisheries, has returned from an inspection trip of the new station at Cazadero, where steelhead eggs are being taken for propagation. Irving H. Wilson has charge of the work. The eggs are being sent to the sub-station at Eagle Creek, where their hatching is superintended by G. H. Talbot. Mr. O'Malley made a trip to the old state hatchery on the Upper Clackamas, last week to check up the property there. This hatchery was originally the property of the state, but in 1904 it was turned over to the United States Government, and full control of the fisheries work on the Clackamas River was given to the Federal bureau. The superintendent found a great

deal of snow on the Upper Clackamas.

### FAREWELL RECEPTION

The handsome hotel was just nicely filled by those who had come to pay their respects to the honored guests who, on Tuesday, departed for Utah. The evening was a most delightful one, and the great crowd speaks well for the city, and its friendly loyalty to one of its prominent families. Unaffected cheerfulness prevailed, and at 10:30 the guests entered the large and handsomely decorated dining room where Mr. Bowers had prepared a dainty repast. At the close of luncheon, the Toastmaster John Stormer, announced that the time for toasts had arrived. Mr. Stratton was first called.
